In addition to receiving a CI\$70,000 scholarship and free roundtrip airfare from Cayman Airways to a destination of her choosing (amongst other prizes), she'll represent the Cayman Islands at the Miss Universe pageant in Bangkok, Thailand, in December.

The 24-year-old striking beauty hopes to use the scholarship to pursue a master's degree in performing arts and help foster the creative arts community.

The Bodden Town native found her passion for performing early on whilst growing up in the Cayman Islands, having participated in many local theatre productions, festivals, and dance and talent competitions. The professionally trained actress, model and dancer is also a writer and certified yoga instructor.

Tyson spoke with Cayman Airways Skies about claiming her prestigious pageant title, her passions and plans for the future, plus her most cherished Cayman holiday traditions.

What went through your head when you were named the winner?

My mind went completely blank. I just paused to make sure it was my number that was called... I had flashbacks of the entire process leading up to the pageant night: the rehearsals, fittings, meetings, the long days and nights... I felt this overwhelming wave of joy and gratitude.

What kind of training was involved?

The training involved weekly meetings with the Grand Cayman Toastmasters Club. We were given many techniques on writing, developing and giving a speech; answering impromptu questions; and public speaking. We were also strongly encouraged to keep abreast on current, local and world affairs. We also received etiquette training with Sherryl Ebanks-Miller, founder of Pinnacle Reach Success; dance rehearsals for our opening number; and weekly runway training.

I grew up dancing four days a week, and I think that discipline has carried over into my adult life. I received my degree in acting and conservatory training in an accelerated programme from The American Academy of Dramatic Arts in New York, and we had no breaks at all, so I think it prepared me well.


Who has inspired you in terms of career and life goals?
